Introduction

This guide has been designed to be used as a starting point, assisting families as they begin to prepare and plan a meaningful funeral service.

It is a general guide only and our team are dedicated to working alongside families to create a service that expresses the uniqueness of their loved one.

We will ensure that different cultures, customs and funeral traditions are reflected in the service.





What to do when a death occurs

At home

- Call the ambulance, treating or on-call doctor to confirm death
- They will provide you with a Verification of Death form
- Once the form is completed contact Logan Funerals to arrange for the deceased to be transferred into our care

At a hospital or care facility

- The facility will make the necessary arrangements for a doctor to confirm death
- The facility staff or the family will contact Logan Funerals
- Logan Funerals will arrange for the deceased to be transferred into our care



When the coroner is involved

- Where a death is unexpected the Coroner may become involved
- Contact Logan Funerals and provide the Coroner's case number and details of the deceased so that we can look after you
- Logan Funerals will liaise with the Coroner to arrange transfer once the deceased is ready to be brought into our care
- If the Coroner is involved this may cause a delay in setting a funeral date

If death occurs interstate or overseas

- Contact Logan Funerals with details of the Funeral Director currently looking after them
- Logan Funerals will make the necessary arrangements to have the deceased repatriated into our care
- Repatriation will involve extra transportation costs and may have an impact on the timing of the funeral

Arranging the funeral

The Funeral Director will meet with you, listen to gain understanding and then gently guide you through the funeral process with care and compassion.

They will also walk you through the elements of a meaningful funeral service, ensuring it is personalised, reflecting and honouring your loved one. From selecting a suitable venue, choosing an appropriate casket, floral tributes, photo presentations, funeral stationery, and refreshments – every detail will be tailored to your needs.

Communication is the key to a smoothly run funeral service and it is recommended that the Funeral Director contacts the Minister or Celebrant to coordinate all bookings, dates and times.

Once the funeral arrangements have been made, the Minister or Celebrant will arrange a meeting with the family. This meeting provides an opportunity for the family to contemplate and discuss how they would like their loved one to be remembered, including any specific content they would like to be included in the service.

Based on the details provided by the family, the Minister or Celebrant then creates a personalised service that reflects the life of the person, bringing a sense of comfort to all those in attendance.

What does Logan Funerals look after?

- Providing a Funeral Director and staff to conduct the funeral service
- Liaising with Minister or Celebrant
- Organise 'live streaming' of the funeral service
- Providing a range of caskets and coffins
- Customising funeral stationery
- Completion of legal documentation
- Order and delivery of floral tributes
- Providing a hearse and other vehicles as required
- Booking refreshments
- Booking musicians
- Preparing an online tribute page
- Welcoming and assisting guests on the day of the funeral
- Registration of death with Department of Births, Deaths & Marriages and other Government Departments

What does the Minister or Celebrant look after?

- Structure of the Funeral Service
- Creating a flow in the service, incorporating music, readings, photos and reflections
- Assistance with writing the eulogy if the family require
- Liaising with those participating in the funeral service
- Being available to step in and read tributes if required
- Leading the service on the day of the funeral
- Providing the Funeral Director the content for the any printed materials





Funerals are important

A funeral service offers those who are grieving an opportunity to come together to acknowledge their loss, pay tribute to the life lived, and bid farewell. The service creates space not only for family but for friends and the wider community to share memories, achievements, and stories, both during and after the service.

Gathering together also creates a sense of communal grief, providing a safe and supportive environment for people to express their emotions and offer comfort and encouragement to one another. A funeral service helps us to know that we are not alone, and that others will continue to stand with us in the days ahead.

Not everyone can present publicly, but there are other ways family can participate.

Before the service

- Provide transport for family members
- Welcoming guests
- Acting as an usher
- Handing out special memorial items (eg. lavender sprigs, bookmarks)
- Assist with car parking

During the service

- Place personal items or flowers on casket
- A musical item
- Grandchildren all standing together while one reads their collected tribute
- Lighting candles

After the service

- Assist with bearing the casket out of the chapel
- During refreshment time gather stories from guests about how they knew the deceased
- Offer to collect memorabilia
- Provide transport

Service Preparation

Some items you may wish to consider to be included as part of the service:

- Songs, hymns or reflective music
- Musicians
- Readings or poems
- Eulogy and Tributes
- Time of reflection
- Photo presentation
- Prayers
- Club involvement and community involvement
- Lighting of candles
- Placing flowers or special items on casket
- Decorating the casket
- Releasing doves
- Bearers to escort the casket

Preparation for a Eulogy

If the eulogy or personal tributes incorporates multiple speakers, try not to cover the same areas. Topics might include a mix of the following:

- Life Story
- Nicknames
- Date and place of birth
- Date and place of death
- Parent's names
- Education
- Occupations
- Church or Community Service
- Life values
- Hobbies and interests
- Likes and dislikes
- Significant relationships
– how and where they met
- Friendships
- Family and children
- Family holidays
- Pets
- Humorous stories
- Their legacy



Example Order of Service

- Entry Music
- Welcome
- Prayers
- Reading, Poem or Musical Item
- Eulogy
- Photo Tribute
- Words of Hope and Comfort
- The Committal
- Blessing
- Final Music

When planning a funeral, it's essential to keep in mind that the average duration of a service is approximately 45 minutes and that funeral venues usually have a one-hour booking limit.
